From the Rectory



Some years ago The Villager ran a front page about our local shops and businesses. 'Use them or lose them', it said, support the enterprises in the parish or they will disappear, to all our detriment. As you may know it now seems that, as far as our branch of Boots is concerned, we might lose it no matter how much it's used.

We all recognise that a private business has to make money, but some businesses can also provide not just a consumer benefit but a public service: they're about more than just profit. Even those who don't often play a vital role in the life of a community. Look at our café, Natter: sitting alone or with friends or family with a coffee and a bit of cake, however nice a thing it might be, isn't something we must do. But after nearly seven years of Natter occupying no.67 St John's Street, how much poorer the village centre would seem if it (or some other equivalent business) wasn't there any more.

Some think business people are rapacious individuals constantly looking for ways to exploit their employees. This is not what I find. The owners of small businesses, at any rate, are mostly people who have had an idea about how to make a living from something that interests them. Of course they want a modestly secure and enjoyable life the same as everyone does, but maximizing money tends not to be their prime aim at all.

This situation is thrown into stark relief when a company like Boots is in fact owned by an American conglomerate which has little idea what local conditions are like. I can't imagine the Farncombe Boots isn't making money, but it's just one tiny element in a vastly larger structure. On paper, there are indeed three dispensing pharmacies in walking distance of Farncombe including another branch of Boots itself, but only if you're able-bodied. Otherwise you have to rely on public transport, which is hardly easy to negotiate, or private vehicles which only exacerbate the problem of the decay of communities like ours, and which you may not have access to anyway.

I've often found it frustrating that the Bible says so little about work! (it says a lot about what to do with your money, but that's a different thing). There must be theologies of work, but I've never read any and we don't have space to work one out here! If we tried to, it would surely have to begin not from the central idea of free-market capitalism (which is to make as much money as possible so that people can pursue their choices) but it would talk about giving human beings the scope to use their God-given energy, creativity and desire to contribute to the world around them. That's something Christians should be hugely interested in.

BINS & FENCES

Great changes have occurred in the church gardens! Well, readers may think they are quite modest changes, but for St John's they're minor but helpful adaptations. The first is the slabs we've placed under our bins to make sure the ground doesn't turn into a quagmire in the winter, while the second is a small fence across the narrowest part of the garden in front of the Church Room. The gate will be left open most of the time, and people wanting to sit in the bench against the boundary of Allingham Court can still do so, but it allows us to close off that part of the garden so our toddler groups and others can use it. The Quiet Garden team paid for the paving, and Cedar Landscapes did the work for us.





DEVELOPMENT

You may imagine that churches never change, and that they're the same from one decade (or even century) to the next. Of course this isn't true – the world around them changes and they need to continually re-assess how they do their work in different conditions, perhaps moving on from things that no longer achieve what they're supposed to, and adopt new ventures and ideas. The Diocese of Guildford, which St John's belongs to, asked all its churches to work out a new Development Plan to examine their activities and think about new ones. Ours was agreed by the Church Council in May and

discussed with the Archdeacon at the start of June. We haven't been too ambitious, aiming at building on our contacts and using social media better, reviewing the way we serve the community more widely, and finding occasions for the congregation to interact in other ways than just services. The most important thing, perhaps, is to base what we do in prayer and a group from the congregation is convening regularly to pray about the work of the church, and discern what God might want from us. That's the ultimate foundation of everything else.

BIG CHANGES IN FARNCOMBE



We have been hearing a lot recently about major changes to two established businesses in Farncombe. The financial group which now runs Boots UK Ltd has decided to concentrate on a network of fewer stores, closing those which are

closer together, hence Farncombe, being close to Godalming, would not merit a store as Godalming "is only a short distance away" as their Senior Customer Manager put it. The Mayor of Waverley, Penny Rivers, and her husband Paul took a large petition to the Boots head office in Nottingham and spoke to the Customer Services Manager but are not very hopeful of any change. Responses to letters sent by local people have been equally dismissive despite the many problems which will face people in Farncombe with mobility and other problems who have relied for years on prescriptions and medications from the Boots in the village.

Another change, perhaps not so surprising, concerns the Station Garage. This has been a family run business since 1952 and the motor industry has changed dramatically in this time, technically and in sales methods. It is sad to lose a local family business but the increasing complexity of vehicle construction and the rise of on-line sales mean that running an 'old style' garage is no longer viable and Brian and Ann are very sad they had to take the decision to close.

There is a proposal to demolish the site, incuding the old school building and develop it as a supermarket with 16 flats above. The artists drawings on publicity material do not create a good impression as they look like a child's set of rectangular building blocks. Farncombe has suffered from poor design of shop/flat development in the past and this would be an opportunity to design buildings in keeping with the traditional methods of design and construction. Another supermarket, apparently one of the 'big 4' would cause additional pressure to our existing stores with aggressive sales practices and would also generate more traffic in the middle of the village, close to the level crossing. The only possible virtue would be a pharmacy in the supermarket.

It is a major concern that this project can be developed without full and honest consultation with all those affected, directly or indirectly. There is a website, www.stationreach.farncombe co.uk which offers 'information' and an opportunity to 'share your thoughts on the proposal'.

The Farncombe Initiative

This year The Farncombe Initiative has continued to work on ongoing projects and is studying new ideas.

OVERGROWN HEDGES

There has been some encouraging action on this. Over the years, the footpath on Binscombe Lane/Binscombe opposite the Binscombe Medical Centre had been gradually swallowed up by soil from the hedgerow and the grassy verge. Council workers have now scraped this back to restore it to its original width making it easier for pedestrians to use.

FOOTPATH BETWEEN FARNCOMBE ST AND MARSHALL ROAD

This is sadly a complicated issue involving different parties, notably Railtrack and Surrey County Council. However, all the candidates in the recent local elections agreed in writing to support this proposal and we shall be writing to the successful candidates reminding them of their commitment to this cause.

FARNCOMBE STREET MARKET

TFI had proposed that a monthly market be held on a Saturday morning on the car park in North Street, opposite Farncombe station - not the station car park. This is owned and operated by Waverley BC, but our proposal had the support of Godalming Town Council which initiated a feasibility study. It appears there are regulatory issues to be resolved and TFI is co-operating closely with Godalming TC on this project.

PLANTER

One of the earliest of our initiatives was the installation of a planter with tree outside the kebab shop opposite Station Garage. Sadly, the tree did not prosper and needs to be replaced with a maintenance

plan to ensure it thrives. We will ask the Woodland Trust to provide a tree under its urban planting scheme and Godalming Town Council have kindly agreed not just

to take over the planter but to plant it with a mix of lobelia, salvia and other plants cultivated in the GTC greenhouse.

FARNCOMBE STATION

A "modernisation" plan is proposed for the rail network, including SWR. Under this proposal, Farncombe will become a Category 3 station, which means the booking office will be permanently closed. A SWR representative will be present from 06.00 to 10.00 Monday to Thursday and 09.00 to 13.00 Sunday. The station will be "unstaffed" Friday and Saturday. The SWR person is intended to help passengers with their enquiries, including tickets which cannot be booked through the self-service machines or online. NEWS FROM BINSCOMBE SURGE

The NHS App-the link to your health records

If you have not yet discovered it, the NHS App on your phone is a fantastic way to connect to your personal GP health record. Access to your record has never been easier; you can view your problem list, test results and even recent letters that form part of your record. Most helpfully of all, it is also the best way by far to request repeat prescriptions. You will be able to see all your medications that are on repeat and order them at the click of a button; if a medication is missing on the list, or you need to tell us something about your medication, then you can also leave a comment for the doctor.

At Binscombe we are encouraging all our patients to switch to the NHS App where possible, since processing prescription requests works fantastically well at our end as well - the request simply pops into the doctor's inbox! This means we can process your request more quickly and with less chance of making any mistakes. It is also less work for our reception team so they have more time to deal with other queries - it really is a win-win! If you prefer to use a computer rather than your phone then you can register for exactly the same access using a website called Patient Access, and if you have any issues with registering or connecting to your account then our reception team will be very happy to help you.

In the light of these developments with the App we will be making a major change to ordering repeat prescriptions: At the end of

September, we will be turning off the Binscombe prescription request form on our website that has served us so well for nearly 20 years. When we first developed this form there was no other option for requesting prescriptions online, but it has finally been superseded by the App and needs to be put out to pasture! For those who can't register on the App or Patient Access there will still be an alternative online request form available via our website and we will always accept paper requests, but please do switch to the App if you can. There are full details about the change and about how to register for both the App and Patient Access on our website, www.binscombe.net.

AUTUMN GARDENING



We hope you enjoyed the Village Show and have been encouraged to do some more gardening in your 'patch'. This is a good time to start preparing and planning for your crops and flowers for this season so here are some ideas.

Vegetables There are still some crops to be harvested – late potato crops, marrows, pumpkins and salad crops but this is also the time to start planting for next spring's crops. The ground should be well cleared and manured after crops have been gathered before planting new crops such as spring greens and cabbage. Lettuce can also be grown when protected by a cold frame or cloche.

Fruit Crops have been variable this year but there are still some later varieties to be harvested. Strawberry plants will have put out runners which can be pegged down in pots to root and then separated as new plants for next year.

Lawns PThese will need a bit of extra care, raise the mower blades to allow the grass to grow a little longer for winter and keep the grass clear of old leaves and other plant debris as this can cause disease to spread. New lawns can be laid but keep them watered as necessary.

Shrubs and flowers These are starting to die down for winter and will need to be kept tidy. Spreading perennials such as geraniums need to be lifted and divided to ensure that the new parts of the plants are kept for flowering next year. It is time to get spring flowering bulbs planted too.

There is always plenty of weeding to be done and this is a good time to check over any garden structures before winter sets in. *Happy gardening - John*





FARNCOMBE FERNS WIN THE I'ANSON CRICKET LADIES CUP


