From the Rectory.



It's a hot and humid August afternoon as I sit to write this piece and I barely want to stir out of doors and thankfully don't have to until I go down to the church to say Evening Prayer and lock up. I think of some of the places where our Forest Church excursions have taken us over the couple of years we have been doing them: Binscombe Fields, where the soil was dusty enough between the rows of crops when we visited, and likely to be even more so now; Broadwater Lake, the path usually crowded with dog-walkers and anglers, but surely not so today even if the water might look cool; and the old Golf Course we walked round at the end of July, probably loud with grasshoppers if any of them can bear to be active.

Part of what we try to do in our Forest Church is to reflect on the way the natural world communicates God's presence and nature to us, and also, in a light and unimposing way, prayerfully to offer to him this aspect of our community's life: to bring the two together. Of course the scenery we move through isn't all that 'natural' at all, certainly in the sense of being wild. It's shaped and constrained by human activity and history, and we think about that too. But we can still see God's command to the world to live and bear fruit continually playing out as wildflowers and saplings take over derelict areas and insects and birds move back into them.

As one heatwave succeeds another we may enjoy the weather, or find it a bit inconvenient. In the middle of one I can't help my mind turning to the vast changes in our climate which make long spells of dry weather more likely. How will these shifts affect human society in the decades to come – what impact will they have on our ability to move about, the water we have available to use, the food we are able to grow? Changes and accommodations will be inescapable, and from

a Christian point of view making sure our decisions and actions are grounded in the reality of what God expects of us is the very first thing we should do.

New Offers for Autumn!




Churches Together Bandstand Service




A reflection on the 15 years of the Farncombe Music Club concerts at St. John's Church.

The idea for the establishment of these concerts came in the Autumn of 2006. I was travelling by train up to London with a local friend and journalist, Grahame Morrison, to attend a Christian Aid march. During our conversation, Grahame revealed that back in the 1980's, he had been a music journalist and also run folk music nights in the Crypt at St. Martin-in-the-Fields Church in London.

I shared that I had a similar interest at running regular live music nights at some point. I had just left working in international banking in the City in June 2006 in order to pursue my dream to run my own music business. This wasn't an entirely new business because it had been evolving since my first foray at promoting live music when I organised a one day music concert in Vale Castle in Guernsey in 1978 as part of my school's charities week, then DJing at various events over the past 25+ years and, since 1991, taking stalls at record fairs selling vinyl records and other music related memorabilia.

Grahame and I followed up this day trip to London with a number of meetings to discuss starting up a regular monthly music night. We discussed possible different local venues. I mentioned that in July 2005, my wife Jo and I had been to see The African Children's Choir at St. John's Church and wondered whether that would make a suitable venue. What it lacked in facilities and comfort compared to other venues, it made up for in terms of acoustics and atmosphere.



We agreed that concerts there would be very much in the spirit of what we wanted to do - as well as offering quality live entertailment - help raise money for the church and other charities such as the local youth project Trinity Trust Team, and support Fairtade with fairly-traded goods such as wine, coffee, tea and chocolate.

We met with Rev. Margaret Blake, discussed and then submitted our proposals to the Farncombe PCC. Once approved in early 2007, we set about booking the first programme of monthly concerts and securing some initial local sponsorship from businesses such as Waitrose and the Co-op. We took a stall at the Spring Fair on the Bury's to officially announce the concerts which would begin in June with an appropriately titled "Evening of Angelic Music" with singersongwriters Liz Simcock and Janis Haves. That concert attracted an audience of about 50 which was an encouraging start.

Audiences started to build and the genres broadened from the initial folk, Americana, singer-songwriter line-up as we started to attract the likes of Kiki Dee, Hazel O'Connor, Benny Gallagher and Jim Diamond who had all had top 10 chart hits. We were also able to involve some local performers including Guildford Vox, Godalming Community Gospel Choir and Reed Maxfield. By now, Grahame had moved away from the area so I continued to book the acts and run the concerts, whilst largely on my own, it would not have been possible without the support of many others which I will expand on later.

Securing Judie Tzuke's show in March 2012 was momentous in many ways. I had approached her booking agent a number of times and then I was contacted just before Christmas 2011 to ask if the church could host the opening night of her UK tour. It transpired that they had rejected the recently opened G Live (which had replaced Guildford Civic Hall) due to that venue's expensive hire costs but wanted something which could still be regarded as hometown / local with Judie's home nearby in Weybridge. Everything was quickly agreed, tickets went on sale and sold out weeks in advance of the show. Our first sell out!

Judie's concert was also the last in the church itself before the church was re-ordered with new flooring, lighting, electrics and seating. The closure was to last a few months and thankfully during that time, we were able to use the church room as an alternative



venue, albeit obviously with a much smaller capacity, for all our scheduled concerts without any cancellations. The re-ordering of the church provided a much more appealing and comfortable venue for all users, not just those attending our concerts. Much credit to Rev. James Rattue, the PCC and all those others involved in that.

Consequently, we were quickly able to attract other name acts such as Beverley Craven, Andy Fairweather Low, Dennis Locorriere (of Dr. Hook), Julia Fordham, Jaki Graham and Nerina Pallot. Over the years the programme had grown from once a month into more regular hirings of the church and church room. Those hirings included recording albums, videos, festival and tour rehearsals as well as record fairs. We also hosted regular Sunday afternoon cafestyle concerts which were recorded for an internet radio show.

As a result of these other uses, we were able to help increase income for St. John's Church alongside other charitable fundraisings for the Trinity Trust Team youth project, Farncombe Day Centre, The Cellar cafe, Christian Aid, CAFOD (Catholic Agency for Overseas Development) and Disasters Emergency Committee appeals. The concerts raised over £100,000 in total for these various charities. As part of Godalming's application in 2008 to become a Fairtrade Town, we also organised a specific Fairtrade Concert.

My eclectic music tastes gradually saw the programming becoming more varied with progressive rock bands such as Caravan, Curved Air, Focus, Gryphon, The Enid, John Lees' Barclay James Harvest and Soft Machine all appearing alongside popular music favourites

of mine including Big Country, China Crisis, The Christians, Space, Roachford, The Icicle Works, The Blow Monkeys, Hue and Cry, Toyah, Glenn Tilbrook, Chris Difford and Dean Friedman.

The COVID pandemic hit right after our most successful year in 2019. Much of 2020 and 2021 was spent on administration with rescheduling, cancelling and relocating concerts caused by the various lockdowns. It was in September 2021 that, after much consideration, I decided to bring to an end the Farncombe Music Club concerts with the final run of shows starting in January 2022 and ending in November that year including some of the shows which were either rescheduled or cancelled during those previous 18

As mentioned above, the concerts would not have been possible without the support of many others. In fact they may not have even

started if there hadn't been that initial conversation with Grahame Morrison. The support of Rev. Margaret Blake, Rev. Margaret Dean and Rev. James Rattue together with the various members of the PCC obviously provided the foundation. Then from a practical level at each concert there were the many volunteers over the years including my wife, our children, friends and relatives. The technical support on sound and lights was provided by some very talented professionals who remain as friends and have worked with me on my many concert promotions at other venues in Surrey. Lastly of course the concerts wouldn't have become so popular without the support of our many regulars who flew the flag and told others about the concerts.

Farncombe Music Club concerts may well have ended but they will be long remembered by many. For me and to use that song title from Hue and Cry, it was a "Labour of Love".



Rediscover Yourself: Find Friendship with Your Body Through Zen Yoga



JOIGNY Twinning with GODALMING 40th ANNIVERSARY


On May 5th 1985 the Mayors of Godalming and Joigny in the Burgundy region of France entered into a Deed of Partnership on behalf of the towns they represented. To carry out the aims of this partnership the Godalming Joigny Friendship Association was formed and since then it has organised visits to and from France. In brief the aim of the association is "To promote and foster friendship and understanding between the peoples of Godalming and district and those of Joigny and district." Like Joigny, Godalming is also twinned with Mayen In Germany.

As this year marks the anniversary of the creation of what is often called the Twinning Agreement, the Mayor of Joigny issued an invitation for an official visit by members of Godalming's Town Council as well as our twinning association. The Town Council delegation was led by Mayor Bob Crook. In the past these visits have often been the occasion of cultural exchanges; amongst these have been visits by the Godalming Band and the Fleur de Lys Morris dancing group. This year we invited the Farncombe Jazz Choir to join us and 18 members took up the invitation.

The members of our group made their own way to Joigny, about 200 miles south of Paris, arriving late afternoon on Friday June 20th. A reception for us was organised by the members of Joigny's twinning group (Cercle d'Amitié Franco-Anglais). Those members staying with families met their hosts ready to be taken home; others left for their hotels. Some renewed acquaintance with friends made over many years.

On Saturday morning we met up early for a guided tour of the town in English. Like Godalming, Joigny has its roots in farming and is connected to Paris by the River Yonne which flows into the Seine transporting agricultural products and wine to the French capital.

It too has many old buildings; 19 are classified as French historical monuments. The best-known is the House of the Tree of Jesse depicting the ascendants of Jesus Christ, which exceptionally is carved in wood.





The choir were with us throughout, singing firstly in the Church of St Jean Baptiste and next in Joigny's covered market alongside the river. The market is the size of a small railway station and holds about 50 stalls inside The choir treated us to "Hit the Road, Jack" to the enjoyment of the many shoppers.

After a quiet afternoon (phew!) we met at the Church of St Thibaut for a c on cert given by our choir and the Joigny Choir which is excellent, but rather more formal. The



church was filled with an appreciative audience. Directly afterwards we left for the Salle Charles Debussy where formal signing of the renewal of the



twinning agreement took place with exchange of civic gifts. Both choirs, as well as the local school choir sang on stage. The day ended with a dinner for 120 guests hosted by the Joigny Town Council – civic budgets are organised rather differently in France!

Temperatures were even hotter than back home in Godalming and when they reached 37 on Sunday, plans had to be changed. Our group went on a visit (with tasting) to the cellars of a producer of sparkling Burgundy wine where 3 million bottles are stored underground in a former chalk quarry which has a constant

temperature of 13. This was very welcome! Back in Joigny there was time for a final and informal reception organised by the twinning association before it was time to say "au revoir" to our French friends, whom we look forward to welcoming to Godalming in 2026 or 2027, at a date to be fixed.



AUTUMN GARDENING

After such a hot summer, with so little rain and a hose pipe ban, it is difficult to find the energy to do big jobs so we will look at some of the lighter jobs to help keep the garden growing.

As well as harvesting our crops when they are ready it is also time to look ahead to sowing for future crops such as onions, for over-wintering plants and spring onions for early salads. It is also time to sow spring lettuce and winter spinach. As well as harvesting crops it is important to get them stored adequately to keep the fruits and vegetables in good condition. This will involve finding a cool place (quite a challenge!) and also shade from direct sunlight. This is a good fruit-picking season with a wide variety of crops including apples, pears, plums and figs.

If you still have a lawn this is a good time to raise the cutters on the mower to allow the grass to recover, some re-seeding may also be necessary.

With the extreme weather conditions it may mean that we have to change our usual routines and even try to use more resilient varieties of plants.


