From the Rectory



Here in sunny southwest Surrey we don't have the most diverse community in the country, and although there are some areas where the deprivation indices are higher than average, it's relatively well-off as well. This means we don't have the main conditions that prepared the ground for the rioting and disorder that affected some towns and cities in the earlier part of August. But what we will have are the underlying human instincts that generate conflict between groups of people, rooted in the fear of having the things we need to flourish taken away from us, or, if we feel they already have been taken away, trying to explain why and to do something about it. Often, we pick on the wrong explanation.

August is a quiet period in the life of the Church as in the rest of society. Lots of people are away and there is less booked in the diary. I've even found time, on a couple of occasions, to walk around a few roads in the parish, praying for the people I know there and also for the ones I don't know. I find myself wondering about the stresses and difficulties people may face that I know nothing about, and reflect that

in other circumstances that's just where conflict might come from. 'Community building' is part of our special mission at St John's. This means that some big events through the year, the Spring Fair and the Village Show which has just taken place, as well as the Quiet Garden and indeed The Villager itself, are means not just of making a bit of money or publicising the activities of the church, but also providing spaces and occasions for Farncombe people to meet and interact in ways that they might not otherwise do. There's a limit to what we can do to promote understanding between people, but we can keep insisting that understanding is what we should all be aiming at – and that sometimes that will mean conversations that aren't easy or comfortable.

In theory, the Church itself should be a community that includes all ages, races and classes. It should be in a small and humble way a reflection of the world to come when all humanity will be, as the phrase is, gathered together at the heavenly banquet of the Lamb. St John's doesn't represent that diversity as much as we would like. But we know what we have to aim at.

St John's 175th - Celebration Evensong

It was July 1849 that St John's church was first consecrated to serve the spiritual needs of the growing community of Farncombe. We're celebrating this year with a number of special events which included a special Choral Evensong on 21st July, the Sunday closest to the actual date of the consecration. We were able to augment our choir with the help of a variety of friends and Richard Stevens acted as director for the service while Stasio Sliwka, organist from St Edward's School at Witley, came to play for us. The service followed the pattern of the 1662 Book of Common Prayer beginning with the plainchant hymn Blessed City Heavenly Salem. The choir sang the Magnificat and Nunc Dimittis to a setting by Ernest Moeran and followed with Martin Shaw's anthem With a Voice of Singing. Revd Margaret Dean, our curate from 2007 to 2011 and now lives in Merrow, returned to preach. We were also grateful for the buffet supper prepared by the



team afterwards! The whole event was a joyous act of thanksgiving to God for those who have gone before us here and the work St John's has managed to achieve. *Photograph by Martyn Sandford.*

Two Old Photos





I WISH I COULD GO TRAVELLING

Approaching my 78th birthday I had begun to wonder if I would ever go travelling again – travelling is not the same as holidaying.

Then, earlier this year, Sue and I received an invitation from a German friend to her 60th birthday celebration in July. She lives south of Munich, only 10 kms from the Austrian border and as we prefer not to fly, we decided to look at going by train.

Coincidentally, Interrail/Eurail announced a seasonal discount. "Interrail"? Isn't that just for students? Nowadays, there exist passes for different age groups from Youth (12-27) to Senior (60+). The price depends on how many days you choose to travel in any one-month period. You can choose to travel second or first class. Passes can be restricted to one country or the whole of Europe (excluding UK). There's an App for this – there's an App for everything! The Pass can also be issued in paper, but the App gives greater flexibility. With this you choose the train you want to catch and "activate" it on the App, but this can be changed at the last minute. For example, we narrowly missed a booked train due to being misdirected by German railway staff. As the train pulled out, I "deactivated" the journey and activated the pass for the next train 40 minutes later.

We decided this was for us, so I bought two 5 day passes and began to plan our journey and the party weekend soon became a fortnight's

travel through Germany. Although there are trains from Paris to Munich, this involves changing stations in Paris whereas in Brussels you just change platforms. So, I booked Eurostar from St Pancras to Brussels Midi (South) but didn't use the passes for this as it wasn't cost effective.

We used our passes to book from Brussels to Cologne where we stayed the first night.

Cologne cathedral overlooks the station.

Next morning we boarded a German high speed ICE train for Munich, a 5 1/2hour journey.

We spent two days here enjoying the sights – and the local beers!

The weekend was spent with our German friends, not far from the

Austrian border and Innsbruck. This included a visit to their local beer festival. This was a family event for all ages from 3 to 90. The Bavarians enjoy dressing in their traditional costumes and, of course, there was an oompah band!

After the weekend we began our return journey. Travelling through Munich we went to Dresden which was our first time in the former East Germany. The historic city centre has been completely rebuilt following WWII, but outskirts have yet to catch up.

After a couple of days here, we continued again by fast high-speed train to Berlin.

Four days in a very lively Berlin and then it was time for the final leg of our

travels, back to Cologne, then Brussels and St Pancras.

We travelled approximately 2.500 kms and spent about 24 hours sitting in trains! Tiring, but very enjoyable. You're never too old for a train ride!



The Farncombe Initiative is pleased to see some ongoing projects come into fruition and is studying new ideas.





If you've been out and about in Surrey this summer, you can't have failed to notice the "highway issu

roads, whether it is potholes or faded and near-invisible road

deplorable state of many of our

markings.

Of course, no-one is happy with this and many take to social media to vent their feelings and let off steam. In the short term this may make you feel better, but it is highly unlikely that Surrey County Council Highways Department staff spend their time perusing these posts to plan their work schedule!

So, what can be done?

Notify Surrey Highways directly every time you come across a "highway issue" by completing their online form. This may take you ten minutes, but it's time well spent. Members of Farncombe Initiative have used this to report about 20 problems. For every report an acknowledgement has been received with an individual reference number for future use, if needed.

We reported the terrible potholes by the "sleeping policeman" outside Loseley Fields school and already two of the holes have been filled.

We also reported faded white lines and got the reply that the lines were no longer needed so were being allowed to fade away!

If more than one person reports the same issue, so much the better! You can use the link below to report more than just potholes. It can be used for blocked drains, hedges overhanging footpaths, road markings etc. To make a report, use this link: https://www.surreycc.gov.uk/ and click on "Highway Issues".

It may well be a surprise to many of us but it is now 20 years since the Quiet Garden at St John's Church was opened. Those with long memories will remember that the churchyard looked very different, even though the yew trees and the rhododendron were well established features. Rev. Margaret Blake, then Rector of Farncombe, had the vision of an open garden space with flower beds, benches and pathways to provide a quiet and restful environment for people to sit and take time for reflection. The plans were drawn up and work started in 2004, mainly with volunteers from church although, of course, the pathways were laid by specialists.

It is a source of amazement how well the various trees and shrubs have settled in – the silver birch were only about 3 metres tall when

planted! We still enjoy the shade from the yew trees and the colours of the rhododendron are a source of great pleasure in the springtime.

On 8th June we invited those who have been involved in supporting the Quiet Garden over the years to a celebration at church and it was good to meet up with many old friends again. The fine weather enabled us to take a stroll round and see how the garden has matured. It is of course important to keep the Garden maintained and working parties meet each month to do the various seasonal jobs. Some of the original team still enjoy the opportunity to do jobs such as weeding, edging and pruning. More help is always welcome and if you have a couple of hours to spare once a month, usually the last Saturday morning, do come along and meet up with the working party for some interesting gardening (and a bit of a chat!)

GODALMING IN BLOOM

This organisation has worked locally for over 25 years to encourage and celebrate the efforts of gardeners in the area and they have an annual event to award cups and certificates to groups and individuals whose efforts have brightened and improved our environment. This year's awards were held on 12th July and the Mayor presented the trophies.

We were delighted that the Quiet Garden was awarded a trophy as runner up in the Community Gardens group and this is very welcome news for the volunteers who work so hard each month to keep the Garden looking peaceful and relaxing for those in need of a time for reflection and thought.

The working parties are held on the last Saturday morning of each month from 9.30 and usually finish around midday and we would be most grateful for more help. We had a special tea break at our last session to celebrate the award! The next dates are 31st August and 28th September.

AUTUMN GARDENING

This has been an unusual year in our gardens with some plants doing well but others struggling. This is at least partly due to the weather but it has meant that our usual routines have had to change.

Among the vegetables, potatoes have grown strongly and seem to be cropping well, as have runner beans, although they have been slow to set. Unfortunately, it has been a bumper year for slugs and snails and several crops have suddenly disappeared. At least we can enjoy some of our crops!

Most of the usual fruit species have done well, blackberries were ripening before the end of June and apple crops are good, so try to pick them regularly to relieve the weight on the branches. Store the crop in trays in a cool dry place (or apple store if you have one!) It is time to

plan ahead too so rooted strawberry runners can be planted out, either in open ground or in tubs and pots if space is a problem. Cut out raspberry canes which have fruited and tie in new ones for next year's crop. If there are suckers growing at the base it is useful to remove most of them as they are not necessary.

The care of lawns has changed in recent years and there are no strict rules but it is a good idea to raise the cutting height on the mower as the growth rate slows.

Don't forget to take your secateurs as you enjoy your walks round the garden as there will be dead-heading of flower plants, pruning of shrubs, cuttings to take and seeds to be collected. Also, don't forget to check your compost and mulch supplies for the autumn.


